In table 2 of this manuscript, the data in the columns headed sensitivity and specificity were erroneously reversed, as were the data in the columns headed negative predictive value and positive predictive value, for the first four parameters (rotation of spheroids, migration of spheroids, ability of cilia to remove debris, and normal ciliary beat pattern). The corrected table is reprinted below.
